

**ETCGR** enables students to begin a career while maintaining their academic studies through the provision of an innovative education and training program that maximises the potential of obtaining a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship.


ETCGR year 11 and year 12 students are enrolled at Gladstone State High School (GSHS) and attend the purpose built college, which is detached from the main GSHS campus. Students are given access to GSHS student support services and can participate in some GSHS sporting and cultural activities, where work allows, and they are also included for invitations to the Senior Formal.

In year 11, students attend the ETCGR 3 days per week studying Maths Essential, Essential English, Certificate II Business and Certificate II Skills for Work and Vocational Pathway. Students are off-site the remaining 2 days engaging in work experience 1-day-per-week and certified training in a pathway of their choosing. The following courses are available to study in Gladstone through the Queensland Government's VET in Schools funding with each student able to access one fully funded course.

### Program Curriculum and VET Qualifications

Vocational Education and Training in Schools (VETiS) focuses on delivering qualifications to provide students with the skills and knowledge required for specific industries. From 1 July 2014, the VET investment budget provides funding for ONE (1) qualification (fee-free) in a skills shortage area for students enrolled in schools. If the qualification is NOT listed on the Queensland Training Subsidies list students are required to pay full fees (fee-for-service). EQIP reserves the right to change program certificates and pathways to ensure alignment to available Vocational Education Training in Schools (VETiS) funded options and local business and industry employment needs.

### School-based Apprenticeship or Traineeship



























Securing an apprenticeship or traineeship is dependent upon variable factors, including availability of opportunities in the local region and student performance. If a student successfully signs on as an Australian school-based apprentice or trainee, they can complete their Queensland Certificate of Secondary Education (QCE) while working in part-time paid employment.

|    | <b>Certificate II<br/>Engineering Pathways<br/>(MEM20413)</b>           |    | Pursue a pathway to an apprenticeship in a wide range of engineering jobs including fitting and turning, sheet metal fabrication, boilermaking, welding, casting and moulding, and diesel, mechanical or electrical fitting. |
|    | <b>Certificate II<br/>Automotive Mechanical<br/>(AUR20705)</b>          |    | Increase skills and knowledge to perform a range of servicing operations on vehicles within an automotive service or repair business, to enhance opportunities for securing an apprenticeship in the automotive trades.      |
|    | <b>Certificate II Resources<br/>&amp; Infrastructure<br/>(RII20115)</b> |    | Gain valuable skills for entry into the resources and infrastructure industry. Learn about health and safety, planning and preparing to undertake a task, hand and power tool operations, and measurements and calculations. |
|    | <b>Certificate I<br/>Construction<br/>(CPC10111)</b>                    |    | Develop skills suited to a range of construction occupations, such as joinery, shop fitting, carpentry and bricklaying.
